20**24** Grand Marshals: Lindy & Patty Hinkelman

GREENCREEK — Idaho County Fair traditions have come full circle for a Greencreek couple.

Lindy and Patty Hinkelman are the 2024 Idaho County Fair grand marshals.

"It's quite an honor to be chosen — I'm not sure we can outdo the Vopat family from last year," Lindy joked about his friends, 2023 grand marshals Jim and Kathleen Vopat.

The Hinkelman family has a rich fair history in their own right, and it started many years ago close to where Lindy and Patty sat recently to tell their story.

"I was raised just a few hundred yards from here," Lindy smiled, pointing from his living room to the house next door. "That was my parents' home and that's where we all lived and worked."

A small grey cat — aptly named Grey — sat atop the chair near Lindy's shoulders as he spoke, looking adoringly at her human.

"That cat loves him," Patty said.

Lindy Hinkelman was one of seven children born to Clark and Eleanor Hinkelman on the family farm on Crea Road. Fun fact: Lindy has a twin sister, Cindy.

Their father raised pigs and crops, and Lindy said he knew as a child he wanted to raise pigs. During his school years, he played basketball, participated in 4-H, and played baseball for one year.

Following graduation at St. Gertrude's Academy in Cottonwood ("Our class of 1970 was the last class to graduate from there before they closed," Lindy said), he went on to the University of Idaho where he studied animal science for four years.

"I attended, but I didn't graduate," he said. "But I needed that taste of independence, of being out and away, on my own for a while."

Patty was born in Seattle and raised in Juneau, Alaska. Following graduation, she went on to attend Gonzaga University where she was roommates with Lindy's sister.

"At first she didn't like me much, and we didn't think we were going to remain roommates, but then three years went by," Patty smiled.

Not only did they like each other, but Patty also found that she liked her roommate's brother.

"My parents were a little surprised I married her," Lindy laughed.

Patty rolled her eyes lovingly.

"My mother loved this man," she pointed to her husband. "She always took his side."

The Hinkelmans settled in Greencreek where they built their own home on the farm. There, they raised four children: sons Zach, Jake and Gabe, and daughter, Tracy.

"This is our little piece of heaven," Patty said. "It was a wonderful place to raise our family."

Lindy set about doing what he grew up doing and knew best — raising pigs.

"I had about 200 sows and was raising them for market," he said. Each sow would have an average-size litter of 10-12 pigs. Later, he went down to a herd of 100.

Throughout the years, Lindy began selling pigs locally to kids in 4-H.

"I really liked seeing those families and kids coming to pick out their pigs each year," he said. "I would follow them through 4-H and school and sports and it's been fun to see them grow up."

As he became a well-known breeder, he was selling 4-H pigs to people from throughout Idaho, as well as Montana, Washington, California and Oregon.

In the meantime, as her children reached school age, Patty went back to college to finish her degree and graduated from the University of Idaho. She went on to teach a variety of courses at Prairie High School in Cottonwood for the next 26 years, includ-

ing English, French and world history. She guided students on tours of Europe every other year for about eight years. After she earned her master's degree, she began teaching dual credit courses: psychology, economics, English, and speech.

Lindy spent about four years as a Greencreek Active Workers 4-H Club leader, partnered with friend Judy Arnzen, when his children were young.

"It was a great experience — Judy did all the work, and I got half the credit," he joked.

A few years ago, Patty retired, and then Lindy retired the following year. Since, he has rented the farrowing barns to Danielle Scott of Nezperce, who has about 20 pigs. He still helps her if he is needed, but said he enjoys not having to be on call 24-7.

Since retirement, the couple has gone on two cruises and will check an item off the bucket list this year: a trip to Hawaii with their daughter and family.

The Hinkelmans have four grandchildren, and they will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary this summer.

"It's been a good life of doing what I have wanted to do and being my own boss," Lindy said.

Patty said she sometimes misses the trees and mountains of Alaska, but she has grown to love the prairie and gets her water fix swimming and kayaking in the farm pond.

She loves jigsaw puzzles, and he is a member of the Cottonwood Lions Club.

A lover of numbers, Lindy is a Fantasy Baseball enthusiast and he and son, Gabe, travel to Vegas and draft their teams, then sit back and watch the games. In 2011, Lindy was so successful in his Fantasy Baseball endeavors he won several thousand in prize money.

"I cannot watch games with him — he's clicking through them, watching many at a time," Patty shook her head, smiling.

"I've basically been involved with the fair all my life," Lindy said. "It's a well-run event and though I'm not sure what our duties will be, I'm sure it will be fun."

"Maybe I will get out of my four-hour stint cooking burgers in the Lions booth this year," he laughed, shrugging. "Maybe not."

"She was the one who convinced my parents that this experience would benefit me in the long run, and boy was she right," Adams smiled.

The brainchild of former University of Idaho extension agent, Mary Schmidt, the Idaho County Ambassadors made their debut in 1997.

Twenty-seven years later, Idaho County 4-H Program Director, Jill Bruegeman, said she feels the Ambassador program gives the older 4-H kids more responsibility and an opportunity for them to expand their leadership role.

"The Ambassadors have always been looked up to by the younger members, so they are essential role models not only in their club, but also at all 4-H events and the fair," she stated. "The Ambassadors are in charge of teaching club roles at the annual Club

Officer Training Day, ribbon recording at the spring show and fair, announcing at 4-H events, and helping out at day camps."

This year's members are Evelyn Ward (Clearwater Valley Junior-Senior High School), Miranda Klapprich (Prairie Junior-Senior High School), Rachel Sonnen (St. John Bosco Academy), Kane McIntire (Prairie), Dylan Klapprich (Prairie), Kieran Gallagher (Grangeville High School), Alanna Brandt (homeschool-Grangeville), Halee Rowland (Prairie) and Autum Martinez (Clearwater Valley).



"When the waterspouts were originally put in, they were placed too high," Astle said, saying some had already been redone.

"I had a huge 450-pound pig last year and she couldn't even reach it the right way," Eich said of his 4-H pig.

Astle, who is a past 4-H member and is now in FFA, said his much smaller pigs have had a hard time reaching water in the past, too.

"The roofs of their mouths get really dry and it's been a problem," he said.

Since both young men had experienced the problem themselves, they were eager to do the project.

"When you have to bring in water like we've had to do in past years, it's just a big mess," Astle said

"Then you actually have to change their bedding more often," Eich explained, which is costly and inefficient.

As with most plans, the project had a few hitches, like the fact they were supposed to get some extra help in May to help prepare for the spring show in June.

"I got my girlfriend, but no one else," Eich laughed.

"Yeah, everyone was busy," Astle added.

The duo not only completed more than 25 hours each for the pig spout project but also helped set up

panels and dividers in the animal barns, spread sawdust and other chores. Materials for the pig barn were paid for by the fair board and purchased at a discount from CHS Primeland.

At GHS, Eich has been involved in wrestling and football. He likes his teen living class (with practical skills such as sewing, cooking and parenting) and math when it has practical applications.

"I'm not really interested in algebra, but learning about stuff like how to file taxes is ok," he said. He also likes teen living, where things such as cooking and sewing skills are taught.

Both students enjoy history classes with Mr. Sullivan, agreeing that "he is one of the best teachers who makes the subject relatable."

Following graduation next year, Eich hopes to attend welding school. Astle is still figuring out what he wants to do; however, both agree they would like to return to Idaho County.

"I definitely don't like the city — it's not for me," Astle said.

Eich agreed, saying he wants to "get out of the area for a while, but definitely come back."

"I mean, everything you want is right here - the river, trails, jet boating, camping, hunting, fishing," he said. "It's just about perfect."

BEST OF SHOW RIBBON - Awarded for superior quality for entire category

AWARD OF MERIT RIBBON - Awarded for exceptional quality for entire category

An exhibitor may receive only two ribbons in a category. No ribbon need be given if the judge feels the exhibits are not worthy of an award. Best of Show and Award of Merit Ribbons will be awarded only to Blue Award Exhibits.

All entries are to be placed on a paper plate in a plastic bag the size of the entry. Yeast and Quick Bread entries must be 1/2 of a standard 9" x 5" loaf. No package mix in any category. Entries of 3 items should be similar size and shape.

EXHIBIT: ½ Loaf Breads; 3 Rolls; ½ Two Layer Cake; 4 Pieces Candy; 3 Cookies. No cream cheese.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH CAKES:

APPEARANCE: Even thickness & surface, frosted or unfrosted. Frosted cakes should have uniform icing. TEXTURE/MOISTURE: Fine grain, moist, does not crumble when cut, pound or bundt cakes should be firm. VOLUME: Should be high and light (unless pound or bundt cake). FLAVOR: Delicate, pleasing, not overwhelming.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH PIES:

PASTRY: Light, flaky, thoroughly cooked. FILLING: Thickened and set up, not runny, cut wedge should hold shape.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH YEAST BREADS:

Bread should be completely baked sounding hollow when tapped. TEXTURE: The crumb should be slightly moist, tender, yet not crumble when sliced, fine grain, no large air holes.

COLOR: Uniform golden brown color on outer crust. CRUST: Wheat items should have a dark firm crust, white flour items should have a golden brown crust with a soft white center.

VOLUME: Should be a tall loaf with a round full roll to the top.

MOISTURE: There should be moisture in the feel and taste of the

item, but not wet or soggy. UNIFORMITY: Entries consisting of three of the same item, such as rolls should all be equal size and shape.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH COOKIES AND BARS: Items on plate should be same size and shape.

4-H & FFA Project Information

All 4-H members, enrolled in a 4-H Club, are eligible to complete their 4-H projects by entering them at the Idaho County Fair on Wednesday, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., except clothing articles, which will be entered at 10:00 a.m. on Monday. 4-H & FFA Livestock will be entered from 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday. Refer to Idaho 4-H Project Requirement Booklet. 4-H Club Secretary Books will also be entered Wednesday and judged with the other projects. Award money will be paid as follows on all 4-H projects:

Blue Ribbon \$3.00 Red Ribbon \$2.00 White Ribbon \$1.00

4-H & FFA Agricultural Projects

- 1. Bedding will be furnished by the Fair Board management, but hay, other feeds, buckets and feed troughs must be furnished by the exhibitor.
 - 2. Cattle should be tied with a halter and neck rope.
- All livestock exhibitors MUST display stock in the arena and exhibit stock for the official judge when requested to do so by the Superintendent.
- 4. All animals exhibited or brought to the Fair Grounds must be disease free. Acceptance of all animals is subject to a veterinarian's approval.
- 5. 4-H entries can be made only in those projects in which the 4-H'er is regularly enrolled by March 1, except that Beef, Sheep, Goat and Hog projects must be selected by their official weigh-in dates.
- 6. 4-H members are allowed to weigh-in, exhibit and sell one market animal project. This project has to be weighed in at the respective specie weigh in prior to the fair. In addition, members can show a breeding project along with a market project. Ex: Market steer and breeding heifer, or market hog and breeding heifer, etc.
- 7. Projects with less than 5 entries will be awarded trophies at the discretion of the judge.
- 8. Care of all livestock animals will be consistent with production practices and accepted standards. Exhibitors must observe withdrawal periods and be aware of penalties associated with off-label use of all drugs.
- 9. A completed and signed livestock record book is due at the Fair office by 9:00 a.m. Thursday. Rabbit, Poultry and Dog record books must be completed, signed and turned in to the Fair office by 9 a.m. on Wednesday.
- 10. All cattle must be dehorned. Goats may have horns but they must be tipped with the tips no smaller than a nickel in size. It is preferred that the goats be dehorned.
- 11. Bulls are not eligible for the show, except for bull calves 6 months and younger behing exhibited in the bucket calf project.

- 7. Hog projects must be able to walk to the show ring and the sale ring on their own. Lame or crippled hogs will be disqualified and will not be allowed to show and sell in the Market Animal Sale.
