2026 GRAND MARSHAL: JUDY FORSMAN

Service-rooted Ferdinand native takes the helm at fair

FERDINAND — For Judy Forsman, life has always circled back to Ferdinand.

Born in Lewiston and raised just outside the tiny prairie town of Ferdinand, Forsman has spent nearly every chapter of her life rooted in the same close-knit Idaho county community she now represents as the 2026 Idaho County Fair Grand Marshal.

From farm chores and roller skating in the old school gym to decades spent serving local students, churches and organizations, her story is woven deeply into the prairie's history.

"I have lived nearly all my life in Ferdinand," Forsman said with a laugh during a recent interview, recalling how her family gradually "moved up" in the world by purchasing a series of small homes in town after first living on a farm outside the community. She grew up as the oldest alongside four sisters, helping raise cattle and hogs and learning early the value of hard work.

A 1963 graduate of Prairie High School, Forsman helped choose both the school's name and its mascot — the Prairie Pirates. She remembers the excitement of students from Cottonwood, Ferdinand and Greencreek coming together.

Not long after graduation, Forsman began what would become a 47-year career as a school secretary, first taking the position in 1963 and remaining there until her retirement in 2011. Throughout nearly five decades, she became far more than a secretary to generations of students.

"You're the face of the school, and you are a little bit of everything to the students," she said.

Forsman said the relationships she built with students remains one of the greatest joys of her life. Even now, former students still recognize her around town and stop to visit.

"I loved the kids," she said simply. "I loved my job."

In about 1990, computers came on the scene at Prairie High School.

"It was a learning curve, but I enjoyed it," she said. "We mostly did administrative reports and grades. I know that it's a lot more complicated now."

Her commitment to community extended far beyond the school office. Forsman helped start the Crafty Critters 4-H Club, which ran

from 1976-1982. She received the 4-H Leader of the Year award at this point. She has also served for years with Assumption Parish, sang in local choirs, volunteered at the hospital and monastery (both of where she still volunteers), and helped organize countless dinners, events and activities throughout the area. She also co-founded the local American Legion Auxiliary Chapter and continues participating in the Ferdinand Women's Card Club, which has met monthly for more than three decades. She also served as a Ferdinand City Council member for 23 years.

Family has remained central throughout it all. Judy and her husband, Mick, were classmates at Prairie High School, and married at 19 before spending a couple of years in Germany while he served in the Army. After returning home, he built a career in logging while Judy continued her work at the school. Together they raised their daughter, Candice [McHugh], and today enjoy having family nearby once again.

Forsman has done a little bit of everything during her life on the prairie, including helping her dad in every aspect of the family farm as a child, to spending about five years raising turkeys with her husband.

"Turkey raising was an adventure," she smiled. She also sold Avon for 35 years.

Forsman likes to travel, and has been to Nashville, Graceland ("I'm an Elvis fan from way back," she smiled), New York, the Bahamas, back to Germany, and several other places on cruises with her daughter,

son-in-law, granddaughter and grandson.

"Mick is not a traveler. He is content to stay in Ferdinand," she said.

Though Forsman has attended the Idaho County Fair faithfully for years — helping judges in open class and in the 4-H building, entering quilts, watching livestock shows and supporting local youth — she admitted being named grand marshal came as a complete surprise.

"I sweated blood," she said, laughing about the moment she received the call. "I was just so shaken. And I'm so humbled. But I love everything about the fair!"

Those who know Judy Forsman, however, likely see the honor as long overdue. Her life reflects the same values the Idaho County Fair celebrates each year: community, service, family and deep prairie roots.

And for Ferdinand and Cottonwood, Judy Forsman is more than a grand marshal. She is part of the town's heart.

COTTONWOOD — "Being able to give back as a member of the royalty court has been both an honor and a privilege," Mikayla Rowland stated.

The 16-year-old Cottonwood resident and Prairie High School junior has been involved in 4-H for a decade through the Cottonwood Saddlery & Livestock 4-H Club, where she currently serves as a teen leader. Her involvement extends well beyond the local level, including service as an Idaho County Ambassador, membership on the Idaho County Fashion Board and participation on the Idaho State 4-H ILEAD Summit Steering Committee. Earlier this year, she and her sister co-presented a workshop at the National 4-H Ignite Summit in Washington, D.C.

Rowland, the daughter of Brent and Tara Rowland, is also active in school athletics and activities, competing in volleyball,

varsity wrestling and varsity softball while participating in BPA, Knowledge Bowl and Prairie League. Rowland has two sisters, Chloe (21) and Halee (17), who also served as fair royalty. Her grandparents include Dennis and Helen Rowland of Cottonwood.

As a member of the fair royalty court, some of her favorite experiences have included the royalty photoshoot, the Princess Tea Party and volunteering at the YWCA Purse Auction.

After graduation, Rowland plans to attend the University of Idaho and pursue a degree in biological engineering. She hopes to use her interests in science and math to solve real-world problems and improve lives.

"Serving as fair royalty has been a truly one-of-a-kind experience," she said. "The lessons, memories, and opportunities I gained have helped shape me into the person I am today."

Supporting the Idaho County 4-H/FFA Market Animal Sale

Buying an animal at the Idaho County Fair Sale is simple—you bid during the sale, and the highest bidder wins.

Purchase Options

1. Take Home

Pay the full purchase price, then load and take the animal home after the sale.

2. Butcher/Process

Pay the full purchase price and choose a meat processor. After the sale, the animal is shipped to your selected processor. You'll need to contact them to cut instructions and processing costs. (See the included flyer for local processors.)

3. Turn the Animal

If you don't want to keep or process the animal, you can "turn" it back to the floor price buyer.

You pay the difference between your bid and the floor price.

Example:

Bid: \$2.00/lb

Floor price: \$0.50/lb

Your cost: \$1.50/lb

The floor price buyer takes possession of the animal.

Another way to provide support would be to do an Add-On. An add-on is a monetary contribution you can give to support a youth exhibitor, without bidding on or purchasing the animal. Add-ons are a great way to support youth who have invested time, effort, and expense into raising their animals—especially if you're unable to purchase one.

How to Make an Add-On

1. Choose an Exhibitor(s)

Decide which participant(s) you would like to support.

2. Select an Amount

Add-ons can be made in any dollar amount.

3. Submit Your Add-On

Complete an add-on form (available at the Extension and Fair offices) and submit payment.

What Happens Next

- Your full add-on amount goes directly to the exhibitor.
- You do not take ownership of the animal.

In the Open Class Exhibits only the best in a category receive ribbons, 2 ribbons of each color will be awarded if warranted. The policy in Idaho County is as follows:

BLUE RIBBON - Best quality exhibit

RED RIBBON - Next best in quality

WHITE RIBBON - Third best in quality

BEST OF SHOW RIBBON - Awarded for superior quality for entire category

AWARD OF MERIT RIBBON - Awarded for exceptional quality for entire category

An exhibitor may receive only two ribbons in a category. No ribbon need be given if the judge feels the exhibits are not worthy of an award. Best of Show and Award of Merit Ribbons will be awarded only to Blue Award Exhibits.

Each judge has the option to choose the one superior quality and one exceptional quality exhibit in the class (if there is merit) to receive a Best of Show and Award of Merit Ribbon. There is no extra money for this award.

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BAKED GOODS DIVISION

Shari Chaffee

All entries are to be placed on a paper plate in a plastic bag the size of the entry. Yeast and Quick Bread entries must be 1/2 of a standard 9" x 5" loaf. No package mix in any category. Entries of 3 items should be similar size and shape.

EXHIBIT: 1/2 Loaf Breads; 3 Rolls; 1/2 Two Layer Cake; 4 Pieces Candy; 3 Cookies. No cream cheese.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH CAKES:

APPEARANCE: Even thickness & surface, frosted or unfrosted. Frosted cakes should have uniform icing. **TEXTURE/MOISTURE:** Fine grain, moist, does not crumble when cut, pound or bundt cakes should be firm. **VOLUME:** Should be high and light (unless pound or bundt cake). **FLAVOR:** Delicate, pleasing, not overwhelming.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH PIES:

PASTRY: Light, flaky, thoroughly cooked. **FILLING:** Thickened and set up, not runny, cut wedge should hold shape.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH YEAST BREADS:

Bread should be completely baked sounding hollow when tapped.

TEXTURE: The crumb should be slightly moist, tender, yet not crumble when sliced, fine grain, no large air holes.

COLOR: Uniform golden brown color on outer crust. **CRUST:** Wheat items should have a dark firm crust, white flour items should have a golden brown crust with a soft white center.

VOLUME: Should be a tall loaf with a round full roll to the top.

MOISTURE: There should be moisture in the feel and taste of the item, but not wet or soggy. **UNIFORMITY:** Entries consisting of three of the same item, such as rolls should all be equal size and shape.

WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR WITH COOKIES AND BARS:

Items on plate should be same size and shape.

Refer to the Idaho County 4-H rulebook for specific project and fair rules.

All 4-H members, enrolled in a 4-H Club, are eligible to complete their 4-H projects by entering them at the Idaho County Fair on Wednesday, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., except clothing articles, which will be entered at 10:00 a.m. on Monday. 4-H & FFA Livestock will be entered from 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday. Refer to Idaho 4-H Project Requirement Booklet. 4-H Club Secretary Books will also be entered Wednesday and judged with the other projects. Award money will be paid as follows on all 4-H projects:

Blue Ribbon \$3.00 Red Ribbon \$2.00 White Ribbon \$1.00

4-H & FFA Agricultural Projects

1. Bedding will be furnished by the Fair Board management, but hay, other feeds, buckets and feed troughs must be furnished by the exhibitor.
2. Cattle should be tied with a halter and neck rope.
3. All livestock exhibitors MUST display stock in the arena and exhibit stock for the official judge when requested to do so by the Superintendent.
4. All animals exhibited or brought to the Fair Grounds must be disease free. Acceptance of all animals is subject to a veterinarian's approval.
5. 4-H entries can be made only in those projects in which the 4-H'er is regularly enrolled by March 1, except that Beef, Sheep, Goat and Hog projects must be

selected by their official weigh-in dates.

6. 4-H members are allowed to weigh-in, exhibit and sell one market animal project. This project has to be weighed in at the respective species weigh in prior to the fair. In addition, members can show a breeding project along with a market project. Ex: Market steer and breeding heifer, or market hog and breeding heifer, etc.

7. Projects with less than 5 entries will be awarded trophies at the discretion of the judge.

8. Care of all livestock animals will be consistent with production practices and accepted standards. Exhibitors must observe withdrawal periods and be aware of penalties associated with off-label use of all drugs.

9. A completed and signed livestock record book is due at the Fair office by 9:00 a.m. Thursday. Rabbit, Poultry and Dog record books must be completed, signed and turned in to the Fair office by 9 a.m. on Wednesday.

10. All cattle must be dehorned. Goats may have horns but they must be tipped with the tips no smaller than a nickel in size. It is preferred that the goats be dehorned.

11. Bulls are not eligible for the show, except for bull calves 6 months and younger being exhibited in the bucket calf project, or as part of breeding project.

1. Each 4-H & FFA Club Livestock Exhibitor will be allowed to sell only ONE animal at the Market Livestock Sale on Saturday.

2. A percentage of the selling price on each animal sold at the Market Livestock Sale will be deducted to offset expenses of the Livestock Sale.

3. Hogs weighing more than 325 pounds when weighed in on Wednesday will not be eligible for sale, steers paid on top weight of 1,650 lbs.

4. To be eligible for sale, market animals may weigh no less than: Steers, 1,100 lbs., Hogs, 225 lbs., Sheep, 105 lbs., and Goats 70 lbs. when weighed in on Wednesday.

5. The buyer assumes all responsibility of the animal as soon as the animal is sold.

6. The 4-H & FFA Market Livestock Sale will be Saturday at 1:00 p.m. in the Vernon Agee Livestock Pavilion.

7. Hog projects must be able to walk to the show ring and the sale ring on their own. Lamé or crippled hogs will be disqualified and will not be allowed to show and sell in the Market Animal Sale.

4-H Consumer Sciences & Specialty Projects

1. 4-H'ers must be enrolled in the current Idaho County 4-H Club program by April 1 to exhibit their completed project.

2. All projects exhibited shall be completed as outlined in the "Idaho County 4-H Project Requirements" handbook.

4. Record books that are displayed as part of the exhibited project must be signed by the authorized leader and parent.
